California Assembly Bill 2642

Effective January 1, 2025, California Assembly Bill 2642 enacted legislation that prohibits a person from intimidating, threatening, coercing, or attempting to intimidate, threaten, or coerce any person from engaging in specified election-related activities.

Summary of AB 2642:

AB 2642 makes it unlawful to intimidate, threaten, or coerce any person from participating in election-related activities, including voting, registering to vote, or assisting in the administration of an election.

Key Definitions:

- Firearm / Imitation Firearm: Any device designed to expel a projectile or appear to be a firearm. Includes air guns and spring guns.
- Open Carry: Public carrying of a firearm, loaded or unloaded.
- Voting: Any action needed to participate in an election (registering, casting a ballot, etc.).
- Law Enforcement Officer: As defined in Penal Code §13519.05.
- Officer Conducting a Canvass: As defined in §18502 of the Elections Code.

Prohibited Conduct (Elections Code §18581):

A person shall not intimidate, threaten, or coerce another person for:

- 1. Voting or attempting to vote.
- 2. Urging or aiding someone to vote.
- 3. Administering an election (e.g., counting or certifying votes).
- 4. Past or present participation in administering elections.

Firearm Provisions:

A person openly carrying a firearm or imitation firearm near voting activities is presumed to be engaging in intimidation unless proven otherwise.

Note: Peace officers acting within the scope of duty are generally exempt but may still be evaluated for intent based on firearm possession.

Elections Code §18544:

It is unlawful for any person in possession of a firearm (or in uniform) to be stationed near a polling place without written authorization from the appropriate elections official. Any person found in violation of Elections Code §18544 can be charged as either a felony or misdemeanor.

Penalty:

- Fine: Up to \$10,000
- Imprisonment: Up to 3 years in state prison, or up to 1 year in county jail, or both.

Exceptions:

- Unarmed uniformed personnel voting.
- Peace officers conducting official business.
- Private security hired by the election office.
